North dakota driving permit practice test

To obtain a North Dakota driver's license, every resident car owner is required to hold one. Non-residents, tourists, and military personnel who aren't state citizens don't need a license to drive in the state. A North Dakota resident for at least 90 days can apply for an operator's license or instruction permit. To do so, they'll need documents proving identity, social security number, and residency. For a driver's license, applicants must be at least 16 years old, while instruction permits are available to those aged 14 and above with parental approval. Applicants for an instruction permit must pass a written exam, which can be taken without an appointment.
